Fort Myers

With the historic River District of colonial buildings in Spanish Floridian aesthetics at its heart, traversed by palm-shaded McGregor Boulevard snaking its way along the Caloosahatchee River to the sea, Fort Myers radiates outward for miles. 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Alva, Buckingham, Lehigh Acres

With an impressive amount of preserved land and natural areas, you'll discover miles of freshwater canals, fishing lakes, hiking and biking trails, horseback riding, tennis and multiple golf courses. Built as the first retirement community in Florida after World War II, Lehigh Acres serves as the residential base for much of the area. Past the subdivisions, you'll find a rural charm, and Alva, the oldest settlement in the area. Buckingham exudes historic character, while its agricultural-based economy spans on both sides of the Orange River (named for distribution of the area's most popular crop).

Cape Coral

Located west of Fort Myers, Cape Coral is known for its 400 miles of saltwater and freshwater canals and vacation homes — yet the adventures you find on land are just as rewarding. Cape Coral is one of the largest cities in Florida by land, meaning there's plenty of space to explore. Immerse yourself in a forest of mangroves at Four Mile Cove Ecological Preserve, where a 6,600-foot hike partly on a boardwalk is open for exploration. Yellow Fever Creek Preserve covers nearly 340 acres of wilderness including a gentle 2.5-mile-long walking trail.

Matlacha, Pine Island, Outer Islands

Matlacha (pronounced Mat-luh-SHAY) forms a bridge from the mainland to Pine Island, which, like Sanibel and Captiva islands, relies only on stop signs to control the flow of traffic. The waters surrounding the island are a hot spot for sports fishers, and wildlife-spotting happens naturally while saltwater kayaking through the mangroves of Matlacha Pass Aquatic Preserve. Pine Island takes you back in time. Found just over "The Fishingest Bridge in the US" from Cape Coral, Pine Island eases into a rural landscape where the speed of life takes a back seat to independence, peace and quiet. Green stretches of pine flatwoods accent the spaces between the island's distinct yet neighborly communities of Bokeelia, Pineland and St. James City.

Boca Grande has evolved into an illustrious playground for dreamers and explorers alike. The community exudes a relaxed and barefoot elegance, the result of life moving no faster than a bicycle or golf cart. The area is also known as the "Tarpon Capital of the World" if you hope to catch the prized "Silver King".

These offshore, teal waters hold some of the best-kept secrets in Florida. With no bridge access, the outer islands attract curious boaters of all abilities. Hop on a boat, take a ferry, or head out on an island-hopping tour. More than 100 islands punctuate the coastal waters with natural experiences not to be missed.
